Dear Members,

Perhaps one of the best examples of this is the inaugural Cuttyhunk Art Festival where WAG members took first, second and third place awards.

But there is much more to painting than the creation of beautiful works of art, the winning of competitions and praise or the sale of these endeavors. While I have always appreciated and enjoyed the end results of others' artistic efforts, I had always resisted the frequently posed question of when was I going to start painting. This past fall I enrolled in a beginner level watercolor class. Time flew by in each class, as I got lost in the process. What I experienced has been witnessed and expressed by many others but perhaps most eloquently by Sir Winston Churchill in an essay called *Painting As a Pastime*. If you can find a copy it is well worth reading in its entirety.

Among his observations was this:

Painting is complete as a distraction. I know of nothing, which, without exhausting the body, more entirely absorbs the mind. Whatever the worries of the hour or the threats of the future, once the picture has begun to flow along there is no room for them in the mental screen.

Once absorbed in the drawing and painting process, all worries and concerns just evaporate for the moment. When the painting time is done, I feel more able to deal with whatever had been occupying my mind.

While art awards and sales are probably not in my future, they are not my goals in taking up pencil and paintbrush. I will continue to work at the skills I am starting to learn. Hopefully, I will see many of you at future workshops, classes, exhibitions and art trips.

#### **Robert Abele's Atelier:**

### **My Treasured Art Refrence Library**

hen I started my formal art training at the School of Visual Arts, I was a young aspiring artist who had the world at his feet. Of course, I knew within a few years my paintings would be gracing the halls of the Metropolitan and MOMA. I soon stepped off that cloud and was put in my place by the amazing talented instructors with whom I was so privileged to study. During critiques, I would hear all these names from art history and I didn't have a clue what the instructor was talking about. I soon realized that knowledge of art history is essential to the development of an artist. This is important no matter what age you are.

A very wise artist told me back in 1993 to treat myself to one art book a month and soon I would have a library that would be a portrait of me and my influences. Since, I have amassed a very diverse collection of books ranging from photographers, painters, poets and all sorts of inspiring material. A good art library should also include how-to books as well. Anytime an artist I admire writes a how-to book I rush to buy it, there will always be something to learn. I have an extensive collection of artist biographies as well, which are great for learning about an artist's technique. For artists like John Singer Sargent, who left little clues about their process, I have learned so much from a good biography.

An art book library can become costly and it takes up space, but even a strong collection of a few dozen books is better than none. You may say, I don't need books I have a computer; you would be right. There is something about sitting in a comfortable chair and flipping through a beautiful book. For me, I will always prefer a book to the computer.

Art books are not always printed in such wide numbers; therefore it is wise to buy a book when you see it. After I see a show that I liked, I always buy the catalog. Just scanning my collection, I have well over 20 titles. I don't treat my books like fine pieces of art either. I drag them to the studio and use them just as I would a tool. I write in the margins and dog-ear the pages—you will often see paint stained corners covered with my fingerprints. The only time I have ever been fingerprinted I might add. One book I treasure and the one I credit for my love

of plein air painting is *Corot in Italy*. This book documents Corot's travels through Italy painting pochades. Corot was one of the first artists to take his materials out of the studio and document his travels in paint. Unfortunately, this book is out of print and can cost quite a bit to obtain. I recommend checking EBay or Amazon for out-of-print art books.

Here are a few books I recommend that have been very helpful to me.

The Oil Painters Pocket Palette, Rosalind Cuthbert.

The Watercolor Pocket Palette, Moira Clinch.

Both books are published by North Light Books. These books offer a wealth of color mixing knowledge that is simple to follow. They unfortunately are both out-of-print but can usually be found on online.

Chevreul on Colour, Michel Eugène Chevreul. A masterpiece on colour theory but also out-of-print and hard to find.

Hawthorne on Painting, Charles Hawthorne. A wonderful account of student stories describing Hawthorne's master technique on landscape painting. *The Art Spirit*, Robert Henri. This is one of my most referenced books and a must have.

I love Barrons art books they are simple to understand and packed full of useful information. Don't be fooled by how simple they look, they are almost written for a child.

The Materials of the Artist, Max Doerner. A historic documentation of art supplies.

Hensche on Painting, Henry Hensche. Explores Hensche's amazing technique and very useful to the landscape painter.

Gist of Art, John Sloan. A wonderful book, often read and reread.

*Elements of Drawing*, John Ruskin. Ruskin is a master art critic full of useful information.

The Art Forger's Handbook, Eric Hebborn. Don't kid yourself—lots of info in this book on technique and quick solutions to art making.

The Grove Book of Art Writing: Brilliant Words on Art from Pliny the Elder to Damien Hirst, Martin Gayford. A great collections of personal stories about artists. Monographs in my book collection include: Whistler, Morandi, Hopper, Homer, Turner, Porter, Dickinson, Constable, Corot, Sargent, Joan Mitchell, Jane Freilicher, Jane Wilson, Wolf Kahn and many more. These titles offer a broad sweep of who I am as an artist.


