A Chat with Debby Conrad,
Executive Director SAILS
Library Network

Thank you Debby for taking time from your busy schedule to meet with me. How long have you worked for SAILS Library Network?

I've worked for SAILS since 1989 (29 years) and will be retiring late next year.

What does your position of Executive Director entail?

Mostly, I oversee everything in the SAILS Library system of thirty-nine libraries in the southeastern region of Massachusetts. I am involved with training on the SAILS network for new personnel for these libraries in the system. I advocate for librarians in their respective towns when needed and we offer grants since most libraries work on small budgets. I often troubleshoot and of course I have numerous meetings that I must attend.

You mentioned troubleshooting. What kind of questions do you get?


Today is a good example of a busy day of troubleshooting. Comcast has been down due to a recent storm and the need for assistance to get back up and running the individual library systems is imperative. Thirty-eight of the thirty-nine library systems are under Comcast. The Westport Library is the only system that is different so you were okay.

You mentioned that you are retiring next year. Do you have any projects or bucket list plans when you retire?

Retirement will give me a chance to travel especially to see my family. I have a number of relatives that live in various parts of the country so retirement will allow me to see them more frequently. I don't have any long range plans yet but I'm looking at retirement as an opportunity to explore different possibilities. Although I enjoy my work, I know that I will find projects and hobbies to keep me busy. I'm looking forward to this new chapter in my life.

What kind of books do you like to read?

My degree from my undergrad was in Russian History so I tend to read books on history. I enjoy biographies, too. I have been recently reading about the Tudors which I find fascinating. Their actions had such an impact on England. Being from Illinois, I also read anything published about Abraham Lincoln. My uncle was a writer for the Chicago Tribune and was a huge fan of Charles Dickens so I try to re-read one of his novels every year in memory of him.





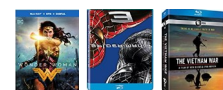

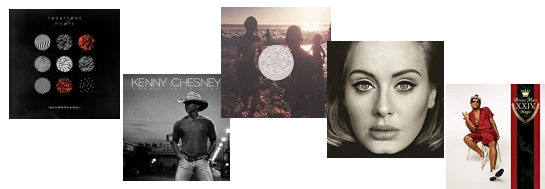

While most of these books are based upon the screenplays, some of them have introduced characters, plots and places that have influenced subsequent Star Wars movies. It is truly mind boggling, but if you want to deepen your Star Wars journey, there are some great web sites to help you choose the right book for you or your family. 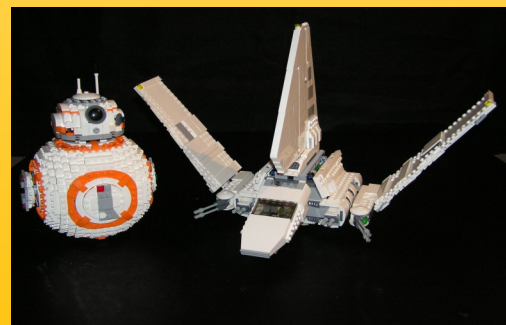
